Everyone with a Bale display in place by July 22nd, 2019 and a sign advertising the upcoming fair will receive \$50.

RULES AND REGULATIONS OF THE SOCIETY

Additional Rules and information are listed at the beginning of each Section

EXHIBITORS

- Anyone may become a Member of this Society by paying to the Treasurer the sum of \$10 before June 1 of the current year and filling out a Membership form which is kept on file with the Board Secretary. (Members are required to serve on committees and assist with other Society sponsored events).
- Anyone may become an Exhibitor of this Society by forwarding their entries to the Secretary with their correct address so that prize money may be mailed out. <u>NO EXHIBITOR FEE WILL BE CHARGED.</u> Exhibitors will be required to pay Admission at the gate.
- 3. None but Members or Exhibitors are allowed to compete for prizes, special or otherwise.
- 4. Exhibitors must be bona-fide owners of all exhibits, and where complaints are made to the Board regarding the same, exhibitors must furnish positive proof of ownership, otherwise no premium will be paid.
- 5. The Society will not be responsible for accidents to any exhibited stock/items or injury to the public.
- 6. All disputes will be referred to the Directors. All protests must be produced in writing and be accompanied by a fee of \$20.00.
- 7. All cheques **must be cashed before December 31st** of the current fair year. All merchandise should be called for by December 31st of the current fair year.
- 8. The Campbellford-Seymour Agricultural Society insists that Exhibitors should have their own insurance for events where it might be necessary to protect themselves. For all Livestock exhibited, the CSAS requires from your farm insurance policy, the policy number, expiry date and guarantee that you carry at least \$1,000,000.00 liability insurance. This information must be included on the entry form.
- 9. Prize money for sponsored classes will not be paid by the Fair Board if sponsorship money has not been received from the sponsor.
- 10. All cattle must be tagged with the nationally accepted identification tags before they are permitted to enter the grounds.
- 11. Any personal information collected by the CSAS regarding exhibitors will be solely used for the purposed of promotion of the CSAS and the Campbellford Fair; for processing payment of prize monies; for publication of the winner's names in local papers; and for the

maintenance of their files and data base. An exhibitor realizes that when they agree to take part in the CSAS and the Campbellford Fair, that their names may be published for these reasons only. None of this information, whatsoever, will be sold or transferred to any outside party for any reason.

SAFETY

- The Society does not assume any liability insurance on behalf of any livestock during the fair. <u>PROOF OF LIABILITY INSURANCE IS</u> MANDATORY.
- 2. Machinery or vehicle displays involving moving parts must provide the level of safety as desired by the Society.
- 3. Any concessions or displays using hydro electricity must do so in accordance with the electrical safety standards.
- 4. All concessions and displays must be neat, tidy and safe for the viewing of the general public.
- 5. The Society wishes to work and co-operate with all exhibitors and visitors to provide an accident and injury free Fair. The Society is always conscious of the need for safety awareness of all livestock, exhibitors and visitors. We continually look for ways to improve our level of safety and ask that all exhibitors and concessions help us achieve this goal.
- 6. HOLD HARMLESS AGREEMENT Upon making an entry the exhibitor shall indemnify and hold harmless the Campbellford Seymour Agricultural Society, their members, agents and employees from and against all claims, demands, losses, costs, damages, actions, suits or proceeding by any third parties that may arise out of, or may attribute to, all operations performed by or carried out by the exhibitor, his/her agents, employees, or servants or anyone for whose acts he/she may be held liable, howsoever caused.

RULES AND INSURANCE REQUIREMENTS- COMMERCIAL VENDORS

- 1. Exhibitors agree to abide by all rules and regulations of the C.S.A.S.
- 2. All vendors and commercial exhibitors must have a minimum of \$1,000,000.00 commercial liability insurance.
- 3. Exhibitors agree to hold the C.S.A.S. harmless from any and all liability arising of the exhibitor's occupancy of the fairgrounds. All precautions will be taken to guard against loss of equipment or display materials, the C.S.A.S. will NOT assume any responsibility for losses that may be incurred from pilfering, water damage, fire,

- accident or any other cause. Exhibitors are advised to insure their own goods against such loss.
- 4. Proof of insurance in effect for the current year must be included with the application for rental space.
- C.S.A.S. had the right to deny vendor exhibit space if certificate of insurance is not received.
- 6. The rules apply to all commercial vendors and exhibitors who are promoting or selling services and/or products.

JUDGES AND JUDGING

- 1. Qualified Judges will be appointed by the Board of Directors.
- Any person attempting to interfere with or influence the judges or who shall at any time use abusive language to any Director or judge, or use fraud, deception or dishonest practices, shall forfeit any premium to which he/she might otherwise be entitled and shall be excluded from exhibiting for one or more years.
- 3. Judges will make suggestions or recommendations for consideration by Directors with a view to improving the prize lists for future exhibitions.
- Judges are expected to act with the most rigid impartiality in all cases of doubt or difficulty and may consult with the Secretary or Directors when necessary.
- 5. In the absence of competition in any class, or if the stock or article exhibited is of inferior quality, the judge may award only such premium as they think the articles are deserving of. No more than two premiums may be awarded to any one exhibitor.
- 6. Where there is lack of competition in a class, the Society reserves the right to reduce payout by 50% or eliminate prize money. This does not include sponsored classes.
- 7. In horse classes, prizes as awarded will be announced from the Director's stand.
- The Agricultural Society reserves the right to reduce or cancel
 payment of prize money offered if weather or other circumstances
 beyond the control of the Society make it necessary to protect the
 financial well-being of the Society.

Any Exhibitor contravening any of the above regulations shall forfeit any premium(s) to which he/she may be entitled.

HOW TO ENTER IN THE FAIR

Entries can be made online at www.assistexpo.ca/campbellford-fair until MONDAY AUGUST 5TH at 7pm. To use the online entries system, you need to enter your email address and your password and click Start session. To do that you need an account; if you don't have one, enter your email address and click Create an account. If you forgot your password, enter your email address and click I forgot my password. Select Campbellford Fair in the drop-down menu. This will link you to the online entering screen. Next you will need to Add an Exhibitor- please enter all current contact information for the exhibitor. From there select Add Entry. You can now select the section and class that you wish to enter. Please include on your entry form every item you are considering entering. There is no penalty for not entering an item previously listed.

Entry forms can also be completed if you are unable to access AssistExpo. Each exhibitor must complete a separate entry form. Additional entry forms an be found on the website at campbellfordfair.ca. Forms must be submitted to: Campbellford-Seymour Agricultural Society- P.O. Box 728, Campbellford, ON KOL 1LO or by email to campbellfordfair@outlook.com no later than August 1st.

Heritage Tractor Club Antique Tractor Pulling Rules-2019

The following pulling rules have been developed in the interest of preserving and displaying antique tractors. It is anticipated that all persons participating in pulling events will accept these rules for this purpose and in the spirit in which they were intended. General rules may change at the discretion of the sled operator as deemed necessary.

- A) Vintage Tractors must be of a model/series that was manufactured in 1959 or prior. (It is recognized that certain 1960 tractors had been allowed to pull previously and they will have grandfathered status.
 - B) Classic Tractors must be of a model/series that was manufactured from 1960 to 1975.
- 2. History of the tractor is to be provided for the announcer.
- 3. Tractor is to pull in one class only, with the winner's option of pulling in a weight class heavier.
- 4. First puller of a class (except in a pull-off) has the option to re-pull. The decision to do so must be made prior to unhooking from the sled and the puller will re-pull in 2nd or 3rd position.
- 5. No front wheel lifting.
- 6. During hook-up, tractor must be in neutral and driver's hands and feet must be off the controls.
- 7. Hook person must stand behind the stop plate to hook the tractor.

- 8. Track width is 16 feet.
- 9. Puller must be available prior to the pull.
- 10. Absolutely no jerking of the sled at start of the pull.
- 11. Pull has 25 feet to restart.
- 12. Torque amplifiers, multi-power or hi-low shifters may not be shifted while pulling is in progress.
- 13. Tractors may not exceed a designated maximum speed limit. (currently 4.5 MPH but this may be changed if the conditions justify it). The first time the horn blows is a warning and the second time is the end of the pull, distance determined at this point.
- 14. No association with drugs or alcohol will be permitted or tolerated.
- 15. No passengers allowed on the tractor.
- 16. Drivers must remain seated at all times during the pull.
- Drivers must be at least 16 years of age. If under 18 years of age, written authorization of a parent or legal guardian is required.
- 18. Tractor must be field stock (not modified in any way). This includes having the proper and complete front-end assemblies and fenders (if originally was equipped with fenders).
- 19. A) Vintage Tractor tires may be "loaded", and wheel weights are allowed but not suitcase weights.
 - B) Classic Tractor tires may be "loaded", and wheel weights are allowed, and factory suitcase weights may be used on factory front-end weight brackets only.
- 20. No string attached to the governor or carburetor.
- 21. Maximum tire size allowed is 38" diameter. Only rubber tires are allowed. The use of radial tires as well as any cut tires is discouraged, as they are not consistent with antique tractors.

CONTEST RULES:

 Number one puller will be the test puller and may take pull if weight of machine is ok, or he may pull in third position. If weight of machine needs further adjustment, first puller after each adjustment will be treated as number one puller.

- All decisions on re-pulls must be made before tractor in question is unhooked from sled. On any re-pull caused by a contest malfunction, puller at this point (by choice) may drop back three positions. Any disqualifications on first attempt, bars a second attempt.
- 3. If presiding judge is notified of a tractor with mechanical problems, he may droop contestant three positions. This may be done only once per contestant per class.
- 4. All pulls must start with a tight hitch. Each contestant will be allowed two attempts to make a measurable pull. An attempt is defined as moving the sled a measurable distance (one inch or further). If the driver lets off on the throttle before going 100 feet on the first attempt, a second attempt will be granted, even if the vehicle rolls beyond the 100ft mark. If no attempt is made to back off the throttle a 2nd attempt will not be granted.
- 5. There will be no test pulls in pull-offs.
- 6. A pulling vehicle may compete in 2 classes ONLY. Only the #1 puller in the previous weight class may move up.
- 7. All contestants pull at own risk.
- 8. Contest to be governed by judges with all decision's final. Judges have the right to stop and disqualify any vehicle if it is being operated in a manner considered unsafe.
- 9. Officials have the right to inspect vehicles and serial numbers at random and upon request.
- All contestants must wear a helmet or WILL NOT PULL IN ANY CLASS.
- 11. Invitational Tri Axel dump trucks MUST have a working pintle hitch and the dump box must be empty, or they will be disqualified and unable to pull.

GENERAL RULES FOR OPEN TRUCK AND TRACTOR PULL CLASSES:

- Although this is not a sanctioned pull, all competitors must follow the rules of ONTARIO TRUCK AND TRACTOR ASSOCIATION.
- 2. No one allowed on track except for track officials and contestants.

- Scales at end of track. All pulling vehicles must be weighted prior to the competition with the driver seated on or in the vehicle. The maximum weight per class included both the pulling vehicle and the driver.
- Drivers must be at least 16 years or age. If under 18 years of age, drivers must have parent's written consent. PROOF OF VALID DRIVERS LICENSE, INSURANCE AND OWNERSHIP IS REQUIRED FOR REGISTRATION OF TRUCKS.
- 5. All pull positions must be drawn not assigned.
- 6. All spectators must be behind the protective fence.
- 7. No mixing of classes.
- 8. Classes in each event will be run in that event but not necessarily in the posted scheduled order.
- No riders are allowed in or on pulling vehicles while pulling or in the track area.
- 10. No pulling vehicles are to be left running without an operator in the seat.
- 11. The contestant must pull at position drawn within 3 minutes of the time the sled is ready. If a puller had a mechanical problem, he must notify the track official before his scheduled hook.
- 12. The person competing must drive the pulling vehicle onto the track and off. All vehicles should leave the track under their own power, unless broken.
- 13. Drivers must remain seated at all times during their pull.
- 14. All vehicles must be in neutral or park while being hitched and unhitched.
- 15. All pulling vehicles must have working brakes.
- 16. Hitch point must be visible and clear for sled hook up.
- 17. Tractors exhaust systems with no mufflers must be pointed away from the crowd.
- 18. No weights behind the rear axle.
- 19. Additional rules may be imposed at the time of the truck/tractor pulls if officials deem it necessary.

HORSE PULLING RULES 2018 DISTANCE PULL BUCKEYE SLED:

- 1. Two pulls must be completed to qualify for prize money. Insurance papers must be presented. To help offset drug testing costs there will be a \$10 fee per team to pull.
- 2. There shall be no alcoholic beverages used by teamsters, helpers or officials.
- 3. All teams must be weighed the day of the pull with a halter and loose shank.

- 4. For light class (3600 lbs and under), scales will open one and a half hours before pull begins and close 30 minutes before pull.
- 5. LENGTH OF DRAW IS 20 FEET. LONGEST DRAW COUNTS, 2 ATTEMPTS. A total of two and a half minutes will be allowed to complete each draw. BUCKEYE PULLING SLED to be used when possible. Pulling sled to be drawn in both directions for two rounds and then only one direction for the remainder of the pull. On the second hitch, teamsters have the option of taking a second pull immediately following the first hitch where the boat is sitting. If he/she passes and takes the second hitch at the end of the round, then the boat can be spotted anywhere on the track as long as there are sufficient side lines left. The pulling sled is to be centred between the two side lines. To be eligible for a second hitch, reasonable attempt must be made on first hitch. Side lines must be 18 feet apart.
- 6. A teamster is allowed two helpers, teamsters and helpers must remain behind the double tree while the horses are pulling. After completing the first pull, no change in teamster will be allowed, except in the case of injury. A teamster must have at least one helper (hooker). Teamster may have a second person on the lines at anytime during the pull as a safety precaution.
- 7. A break in harness: the teamster will decide if he keeps the distance or will start over.
- A run-away team or team out of control will automatically be eliminated and drug tested at the teamster's expense or be deemed a positive test.
- 9. A pull will be disqualified if:
 - a. If horses' step on or over lines or markers;
 - If horses are beaten, lines are swung, foul language used;
 - If teamsters or helpers head the horses while pulling or hitching;
 - d. If teamster or helpers slap, push, or touch the horses with hand, lines or whiffle trees while in the ring.
 NO CHECK SLAPS WILL BE ALLOWED

- 10. Three circles passing in front of boat or anything over a twelve-inch chuck will be classified as one pull.
- 11. Any teamster or helper will automatically be ejected from the contest with all winnings forfeited if they argue with the judge, fair board, pulling committee or other contestants.
- 12. NO CHANGING OF BRIDLES DURING THE PULL.
- 13. DRUG TESTING TO BE ENFORCED:
 - a. No drugs allowed.
 - Any harassment or non-compliance with veterinarian will be deemed a positive test. This is to be at the discretion of the veterinarian and horse pull officials/committee.
 - No team or teamster allowed to pull while under suspension with any other organization.
 - d. Forfeit prize money and placing.
 - e. Additional penalty as fair board concerned feels appropriate.
- 14. A winner must be determined at the sled. Teamster must indicate to the JUDGE their intent to withdraw from the contest before leaving the pull area on their last hitch. Placing in the contest will be done in order of withdrawal. Failure to comply with this rule will result in HITCHMONEY ONLY.
- 15. A horse is allowed to complete in only one class.
- 16. All animals must be vaccinated for rabies for any show at the fair.

- Treating the udder internally or externally with an irritant, counter-irritant, or any other substance to temporarily improve conformation or produce unnatural animation:
- Inserting foreign material/articles under the skin, into the topline (including hair not attached to its own hair follicle);
- Criticizing or interfering with the judge(s), show management or other exhibitors while in the show ring, as well as any conduct that violates, directly or indirectly, recognized standard show practices.




