GENERAL RULES AND REGULATIONS

EXHIBITORS

1. Anyone may become a Member of this Society by paying to the Treasurer the sum of \$10 **before June 1 of the current year** and filling out a Membership form which is kept on file with the Board Secretary. (Members are required to serve on committees and assist with other Society sponsored events). Memberships are not required to enter in the fair.
2. Anyone may become an Exhibitor of this Society by forwarding their entries to the Secretary with their correct address so that prize money may be mailed out. **NO EXHIBITOR FEE WILL BE CHARGED.** Exhibitors will be required to pay Admission at the gate.
3. None but Members or Exhibitors can compete for prizes, special or otherwise.
4. Exhibitors must be bona-fide owners of all exhibits, and where complaints are made to the Board regarding the same, exhibitors must furnish positive proof of ownership, otherwise no premium will be paid.
5. The Society will not be responsible for accidents to any exhibited stock/items or injury to the public.
6. All disputes will be referred to the Directors. All protests must be produced in writing and be accompanied by a fee of \$20.00.
7. All cheques **must be cashed before December 31st** of the current fair year. All merchandise should be called for by December 31st of the current fair year.
8. The Campbellford-Seymour Agricultural Society insists that Exhibitors should have their own insurance for events where it might be necessary to protect themselves. **For all Livestock exhibited, the CSAS requires from your farm insurance policy, the policy number, expiry date and guarantee that you carry at least \$2,000,000.00 liability insurance. This information must be included on the entry form.**
9. Prize money for sponsored classes **will not be paid by the Fair Board** if sponsorship money has not been received from the sponsor.

10. **All cattle must be tagged with the nationally accepted identification tags before they are permitted to enter the grounds.**
11. Any personal information collected by the CSAS regarding exhibitors will be solely used for the purpose of promotion of the CSAS and the Campbellford Fair; for processing payment of prize monies; for publication of the winner's names in local papers; and for the maintenance of their files and database. An exhibitor realizes that when they agree to take part in the CSAS and the Campbellford Fair, that their names may be published for these reasons only. None of this information, whatsoever, will be sold or transferred to any outside party for any reason.

SAFETY

1. The Society does not assume any liability insurance on behalf of any livestock during the fair. **PROOF OF LIABILITY INSURANCE IS MANDATORY.**
2. Machinery or vehicle displays involving moving parts must provide the level of safety as desired by the Society.
3. Any concessions or displays using hydro electricity must do so in accordance with the electrical safety standards.
4. All concessions and displays must be neat, tidy, and safe for the viewing of the general public.
5. The Society wishes to work and co-operate with all exhibitors and visitors to provide an accident and injury free Fair. The Society is always conscious of the need for safety awareness of all livestock, exhibitors, and visitors. We continually look for ways to improve our level of safety and ask that all exhibitors and concessions help us achieve this goal.
6. **HOLD HARMLESS AGREEMENT** – Upon making an entry the exhibitor shall indemnify and hold harmless the Campbellford Seymour Agricultural Society, their members, agents and employees from and against all claims, demands, losses, costs, damages, actions, suits or proceeding by any third parties that may arise out of, or may attribute to, all operations performed by or carried out by the exhibitor, his/her agents, employees, or

servants or anyone for whose acts he/she may be held liable, howsoever caused.

RULES AND INSURANCE REQUIREMENTS- COMMERCIAL VENDORS

1. Exhibitors agree to abide by all rules and regulations of the CSAS
2. All vendors and commercial exhibitors must have a minimum of \$1,000,000.00 commercial liability insurance.
3. Exhibitors agree to hold the CSAS harmless from any and all liability arising of the exhibitor's occupancy of the fairgrounds. All precautions will be taken to guard against loss of equipment or display materials, the CSAS will NOT assume any responsibility for losses that may be incurred from pilfering, water damage, fire, accident, or any other cause. Exhibitors are advised to insure their own goods against such loss.
4. **Proof of insurance in effect for the current year must be included with the application for rental space.**
5. CSAS has the right to deny vendor exhibit space if certificate of insurance is not received.
6. The rules apply to all commercial vendors and exhibitors who are promoting or selling services and/or products.

JUDGES AND JUDGING

1. Qualified Judges will be appointed by the Board of Directors.
2. Any person attempting to interfere with or influence the judges or who shall at any time use abusive language to any Director or judge, or use fraud, deception or dishonest practices, shall forfeit any premium to which he/she might otherwise be entitled and shall be excluded from exhibiting for one or more years.
3. Judges will make suggestions or recommendations for consideration by Directors with a view to improving the prize lists for future exhibitions.
4. Judges are expected to act with the most rigid impartiality in all cases of doubt or difficulty and may consult with the Secretary or Directors when necessary.
5. In the absence of competition in any class, or if the stock or article exhibited is of inferior quality, the judge may award only

- such premium as they think the articles are deserving of. No more than two premiums may be awarded to any one exhibitor.
6. Where there is lack of competition in a class, the Society reserves the right to reduce payout by 50% or eliminate prize money. This does not include sponsored classes.
 7. In horse classes, prizes as awarded will be announced from the Director's stand.
 8. The CSAS reserves the right to reduce or cancel payment of prize money offered if weather or other circumstances beyond the control of the Society make it necessary to protect the financial well-being of the Society.

Any Exhibitor contravening any of the above regulations shall forfeit any premium(s) to which he/she may be entitled.

MAPLE SYRUP

Committee: Jennifer Jeffs 705-653-2249

Notes for exhibiting:

- All entries must be in place by 12 noon, Friday of the fair in the Curling Club.

Rules and Regulations:

1. Exhibitors of maple syrup must be the producer and the exhibits shown by them must be product of their operation.
2. Not more than one entry per class will be accepted from an exhibitor.
3. Maple Syrup exhibits shall consist of one (1) Kent Type glass bottle of maple syrup, having a capacity of 250 ml (U.S. 8.5 oz), which may be picked up at the end of the fair along with their individual score sheet/s.
4. Entries must be from the current season and is the exhibitor's responsibility to enter in the correct colour class.
5. Maple syrup that tests less than 66.0 Brix or higher than 68.9 Brix, as determined by a refractometer, or syrup brix hydrometer with temperature correction to obtain the true density will be disqualified.
6. All maple syrup should have flavour characteristic of its respective colour class and be free from any objectionable odour or taste. Any maple syrup entry containing any form of foreign material will be disqualified from the competition.
7. Maple syrup and maple products will be judged under the guidelines of the North American Maple Contest Judging Guidelines as used by the International Maple Syrup Institute. (IMSI) and the Federal maple products regulation (C.R.C., c.289). For more information please visit:

Maple Syrup- Judging Score Card

Flavour- 40 points- pleasing maple flavour, one that only comes from the sap of the maple tree

Density- 30 points- entries within the 66.5 -67.5 Brix will receive full points. Entries with densities between 66.0 to 66.4 Brix or 67.6 to 68.9 Brix will receive 25 points. Entries with densities below 66.0 Bix or above 68.9 Brix will be disqualified.

Colour- 20 points- Entries entered in the correct class receive full points

Clarity- 10 points- Maple syrup should be crystal clear, points deducted for unclean containers

PRIZES: 1st—\$30; 2nd—\$25; 3rd—\$20, unless otherwise specified

CLASSES:

1. Maple Syrup, Ontario Grade A, Golden, one 250-ml. Kent Bottle
2. Maple Syrup, Ontario Grade A, Amber, one 250-ml. Kent Bottle
3. Maple Syrup, Ontario Grade A, Dark, one 250-ml. Kent Bottle
4. Maple Syrup, Ontario Grade A, Very Dark, one 250-ml. Kent Bottle

5. **MARCUS MINTO CURLE MAPLE AWARD- *In Memory of Marcus' grandfather and past President of the fair board***
Sponsored by Diane and Marcus Curle

Awarded to the exhibitor that has the best overall syrup as judged from the four 1st place winners from the 4 classes.

Prize: *This is a perpetual trophy and is not handed out, but a suitable smaller keeper trophy will be awarded to the winner and their name and year inscribed on the Memorial Trophy.*

OAAS MAPLE SYRUP COMPETITION- Pure Maple Syrup, Ontario Grade A- Amber

RULES:

District Competition Each agricultural society is entitled to send their best of show to the district competition. If the exhibitor has won at more than one fair, the one closest to the exhibitor's home address is the agricultural society from which the entry will be sent to the district competition. The other agricultural societies may send their second-place winner into the district competition. An exhibitor may only enter one district competition. The OAAS will award a ribbon to exhibitors of winning entries at each district competition.



FIELD CROPS: Section 28

Field Visits: Wheat (Judging to be the end of July)

Field Crops in the field to be scored while standing in a field near maturity. The field must be at least 3 acres in size. Consideration is given to purity of variety, freedom from weeds and other plants, freedom from plant disease and insects, stand and vigour of the crop, and neatness of headlands.

Each field will be awarded a value out of 100. On exhibition day the sample will also be awarded a value out of 100. The points will be added together and the person with the highest combined points will be the winner of the class.

Notes for exhibiting Field Crops:

ELIGIBILITY, RULES AND REGULATIONS

Rules:

1. The quilt must be solely made, and hand quilted by the exhibitor and exhibited and judged at a local Ontario Association of Agricultural Societies (OAAS) fair to be eligible for this competition. 2.
2. Quilts to be measured on the perimeter. Total perimeter measurement to be a minimum of 280 inches. Note the quilt can be square, rectangular etc. All



4 sides must be measured to determine the perimeter measurement.

3. The quilting must be through all 3 layers (top, batting and back) and not be mounted on a frame. The quilt may have a sleeve attached to the back for the purpose of hanging the quilt.
4. The winning OAAS Hand Quilt will not be eligible to compete in any future OAAS fair, district and/or provincial competitions.
5. It is the exhibitor's responsibility to give credit to the original designer of the quilt pattern based on copyright rules.

District Competition

6. Each local fair is entitled to send their best of show of all eligible hand quilts to the district competition.
7. If the fair's best of show hand quilt has won at more than one fair, the exhibitor must consider their own agricultural society as the one from which the quilt will be sent to the district meeting, otherwise it should be sent from the agricultural society nearest his/her home address. The other fairs at which this quilt was entered and won, may enter their second best of show hand quilt into the district competition.
8. An exhibitor who wins more than one best of show title with different hand quilts at different fairs is entitled to enter each winning quilt in the district competition.
9. If an exhibitor is exhibiting in more than one district, they are entitled to enter different winning quilts at different district competitions but cannot enter the same quilt at more than one district competition.
10. The OAAS will award a ribbon to exhibitors of winning hand quilts at each district competition.

2. Quilts to be measured on the perimeter. Total perimeter measurement to be a minimum of 280 inches. Note the quilt can be square, rectangular etc. All 4 sides must be measured to determine the perimeter measurement.
3. The quilting must be through all 3 layers (top, batting and back) and not be mounted on a frame. The quilt may have a sleeve attached to the back for the purpose of hanging the quilt.
4. The winning OAAS Machine Quilt will not be eligible to compete in any future OAAS fair, district and/or provincial competitions.
5. It is the exhibitor's responsibility to give credit to the original designer of the quilt pattern based on copyright rules.
6. The use of domestic, mid arm and/or long arm equipment is permitted on hand or computer guided machine quilt entries.



District Competition

7. Each local fair is entitled to send their best of show of all eligible machine quilts to the district competition.
8. If the fair's best of show machine quilt has won at more than one fair, the exhibitor must consider their own agricultural society as the one from which the quilt will be sent to the district meeting, otherwise it should be sent from the agricultural society nearest his/her home address. The other fairs at which this quilt was entered and won, may enter their second best of show machine quilt into the district competition.
9. An exhibitor who wins more than one best of show title with different machine quilts at different fairs is entitled to enter each winning quilt in the district competition.
10. If an exhibitor is exhibiting in more than one district, they are entitled to enter different winning quilts at different district competitions but cannot enter the same quilt at more than one district competition.

11. The OAAS will award a ribbon to exhibitors of winning machine quilts at each district competition.

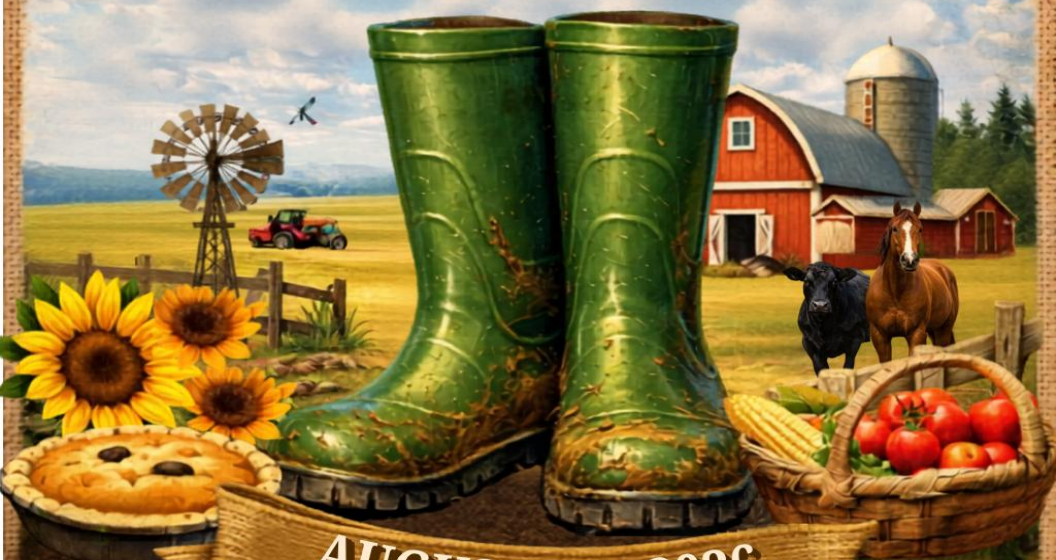
